

#### Walking with Jesus - A Lenten Study



# Walking with Jesus A Lenten Study

Easter is at the heart of the Christian faith and its most important festival, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus on the third day after his death – three days that changed the world.

The days leading up to and beyond the Cross are busy ones for Jesus and his followers. There is a potentially dangerous journey to make it to Jerusalem for the Passover celebrations and a waiting Cross and later, following the Resurrection, another from Jerusalem to Emmaus. In-between are several incidents and opportunities for Jesus to teach that are maybe not so well known but important in the bigger picture. On our own journey through Lent it is a good time to see how these stories, big and small, shared by the writers of the gospels, feed into our understanding of who Jesus is and what Easter means for us.

Join us for our Lenten Study "Walking with Jesus" as we explore this moment from the perspectives of

<u>Mark</u>: who wrote the shortest Gospel and with a Roman audience in mind, <u>Matthew</u>: who wrote for a Jewish audience and referenced the Old Testament over 100 times,

emphasizing Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah,

Luke: a doctor, historian and non-Jew, and who wrote mainly to a Gentile audience, with an emphasis on the marginalise,

<u>John</u>: who took a different approach, beginning with echoes of Genesis and introducing Jesus as one who will bring a new creation.

• Letter to the Diocese from Bishop Andrew – February 14<sup>th</sup>, 2025

#### Dear Friends,

As we start this long weekend, I am taking a break from shovelling snow (my favourite chore!) to say a short word about Family Day, and about one significant part of our own diocesan family.

As you know, I am blessed with my wonderful wife Mary, five amazing children, and a wide, weird and wonderful set of relatives that I love. And I am also grateful to God for my diocesan family, the family of our Church – including you.

Whether your own family circle is large or small, whether your family is by birth or choice, whether you have a "Valentine" on this day or not – I hope that you know that through baptism you are a member of God's family, and you are deeply, wholly, perfectly loved. As an Anglican Christian in this part of the world, I thank God for you and your participation in our Diocese, and I want to express my appreciation for you, for your contributions to the Church, for your life of prayer and service, and for your desire to follow Christ and make Him known in a troubled and turbulent world. You are a gift, and I am grateful.

Today, I also want to give a particular shout-out to one community in our family that we honour each February, which is the Black community. Our siblings in Christ who are part of the African diaspora enrich our common life with their vibrant faith, worship, and powerful voices for God's reign of justice and inclusion. Black history rightfully receives attention each and every February; it is a long and powerful story of oppression and dehumanization, but it also teaches us about resilience, tenacity, community and leadership. It is a necessary annual reminder of humanity's innate sinfulness, our need for the amazing Grace of God and Christ's redemptive acts, and the power of righteous and prophetic voices to speak into a fallen world and enact change.

The 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Black History Celebration will take place at St. James Cathedral on Sunday, Feb. 23 at 4:30 p.m. My letter to the Black community gathered on that occasion is available for reading <u>here</u>, but better still, I encourage the entire diocesan family to come out that day to celebrate Black Anglicans and their presence in our

Church. I can promise you an amazing worship experience. It will be a great opportunity to gather as God's beloved children and to rejoice in our life together in Christ.


Eucharistic Services – Season of Spiritual Renewal

# • Read the Bible in One Year

The Bible is alive.

The Bible gives us wisdom. Written over a period of centuries, the inspired scrolls provide solutions for every situation we can face.

The Bible tells us of the Savior who loves us.

The Bible feeds us. Jesus is God's Word in the flesh, and He is the bread of life for our souls.

# 6 Benefits of Reading the Bible from Beginning to End Each Year

**1. Reading through the Bible every year can instill discipline in making time with the Lord a priority.** We develop the habit which becomes a part of everyday life.

But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. (Matthew 6:33 NIV)

**2. We can gain new insight.** When we approach our reading with an open heart we can read the same passages over and over and receive a different revelation.

Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. (<u>2 Timothy 2:15</u> NIV)

3. We learn how each part of the Bible relates to itself.

And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself. (Luke 24:27)

# 4. We can glean insight from the sacred writings into all aspects of life.

The unfolding of your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple. (Psalm 119:130)

**5. Reading chronologically helps us put the historical record into perspective.** When we see the order of events the whole picture of the Creator's purpose can become clearer. We can learn more about the progression of Israel's formation.

For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide we might have hope. (Romans 15:4)

**6. We learn the order of the books of the Bible.** This is not a prerequisite for spiritual enlightenment but learning the sequence of the writings can help us when searching for a particular book.

But if from there you seek the Lord your God, you will find him if you seek him with all your heart and with all your soul. (Deuteronomy 4:29)

# Luke 6:27 - 38

"Gracious God, thank you for sending Jesus to teach us, guide us, and impart your wisdom to us. May we love, bless, and give to the world as you have shown us. Amen. "

Have you ever played tag with just ONE other person? Is that a fun game of tag? Or is it better when a number of people play? I like it better when a bunch of people play together.

Let's remember this idea of tag being more fun when there's more people playing it as we talk about today's scripture story. In today's story, we hear Jesus teach his disciples how to respond to their enemies. The lessons he gives them are very difficult things to do and even think about. He tells them to love their enemies. He tells them to not judge their enemies. He tells them to give away their things to the people who are stealing from them.

The idea of tag is helpful in understanding what Jesus is saying. In a game of tag with two people, what does the IT person want to do to the other person? She wants to tag them. And then what does the new IT person want to do to the other person. Again, tag them. Right! It just goes back and forth, back and forth.

When people do things to us that we think are unfair or mean, we often want to "get back" at them. But Jesus offers a different option. Jesus invites us to follow him. And when we choose to follow him, we learn from him how to receive God's love, healing, and mercy. And how to share this love, healing, and mercy we have with others – even those who are being unfair or mean to us. Which then stops the back-n-forth tagging and helps to make God's kingdom on earth a reality.

"God Our Teacher and Redeemer, thank you for all you have given us. Help us to leave this place, remembering your words, honoring what you have asked us to do, and living how you have instructed us. Help us to love and be loved, to bless and receive blessings, to give and receive that we may know you through each other. Amen."
