• FaithWorks Update





The following articles are from **Alongside Hope** (formerly PWRDF), a FaithWorks ministry partner.

After a two-year process, PWRDF has changed its name to Alongside Hope (Auprès de l'espoir in French). The new name reflects the our focus on partnership and collaboration with local organizations, membership organizations, funding agencies, the Anglican Church of Canada, and donors. The name change was approved on October 15, 2024, and took effect on March 1, 2025. Archbishop Linda Nicholls and Archbishop Anne Germond were and continue to be most helpful and supportive.

The theme of partnership or accompaniment is woven throughout the Bible, but the task team was drawn to the story of the road to Emmaus. Days after Jesus died, the disciples were walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus, still grieving their loss. As Luke writes, the resurrected Jesus came **alongside** them, but they did not know it was him. Jesus travelled with them and then accepted their hospitality to dine with them. In the breaking of bread, their eyes were opened and they recognized him. When we walk **alongside** one another, Jesus accompanies us. We are strengthened and comforted and recognize Jesus when we share in his feast.

Alongside Hope - Auprès de l'espoir

- It requires no lengthy or clumsy acronym.
- It de-emphasizes the colonial, top-down approach of giving and emphasizes a more collaborative approach.

It is a name that will carry us forward into the future.

Alongside Hope issues urgent appeal for partners hurt by aid cuts

In the wake of massive cuts to international development assistance by the U.S. Government and some European governments, Alongside Hope partners are reporting that progress is being undone, programs are being forced to shut down, and families and communities are living in uncertainty about their futures.

The damage done is staggering. We cannot possibly fill all the gaps, but to maintain as many vital programs as possible, Alongside Hope is launching an urgent appeal to donors. Your support of the "**Resilience Fund**" will allow Alongside Hope to provide partners with additional support for refugees, HIV-related needs and for women recovering from gender-based-violence. These include:

Tanzania

· Families supported by Church World Service who were preparing for a new life in the United States and had already left the Nyarugushu refugee camp and given away their possessions were forced to return to the camp with nothing, their dreams of resettlement shattered with the suspension of the US Refugee Resettlement Program.

Kenya

- · Children are already missing life-saving anti-retroviral medications. And their caregivers are no longer receiving vital support.
- · 42 staff at National Council of Churches Kenya who were providing youth mentorship programming and support for school fees have been laid off, affecting 8,000 youth and 8,000 orphans and vulnerable children.
- · Children are no longer able to attend school.

Mozambique

· A five-year program with partner EHALE that was improving maternal health services and access to health care for young mothers was forced to shut down.

Democratic Republic of the Congo

· Plans for a program with the Panzi Foundation that would have brought dignity to women recovering from gender-based violence have been shelved.

Haiti

· Medical services and referrals for community members working with Rayjon Share Care are not being provided due to cuts to hospitals that had been receiving USAID supplies.

Friday, April 11th, 2025



Dear Friends,

"I have been driven many times upon my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go. My own wisdom and that of all about me seemed insufficient for that day." President Abraham Lincoln was heard to say these words after the Union Army's devastating loss at the Second Battle of Bull Run in 1862. How poignant, honest and heartfelt is the sentiment spoken by a president longing for peace in a time of bitterness and pain. In our present time of deep division, broken promises, economic upheaval, the threat of tariff and job loss, we long for the same sincerity.

This quote of President Lincoln sets the clip for how we approach the week that is upon us: on our knees. The journey of Holy Week beckons us to watch, to listen and to pray our way. The cheers of Palm Sunday become jeers of disappointment. Feet are washed and the bread and cup are shared to deepen the ways of servanthood. The Garden of Gethsemane becomes the place where anguish is turned into resolve. Pontius Pilate washes his hands. The crowd shouts, *crucify him!* The hammer drives the point through flesh and wood. *My God, my God, why have you forsaken me,* echoes from the cross. He breathes his last. The curtain is torn asunder. His body is retrieved and placed in the tomb... And beyond our comprehension and wisdom, what happens on Easter Day changes everything for good!

Clear your calendar this week. Make room and time for the liturgies of Holy Week. Pray your way from Sunday to Sunday. Attend to the want and hope that is in you. This is the week that restores our memory. This is the week when a dead end becomes the beginning.

Youth Corner

20 April 2025

Easter

"Thank you, God, for the gift of Easter. Thank you for Jesus who was willing to die as he shows us how to live. Alleluia, Christ is Risen! Amen."

"Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again." An astounding discovery! The Easter news was spread to all who would listen. The disciples told people, who in turn, told people, and to this day, we hear the message — a message of weeping and then of joy that comes with the morning of a new day. "

Can you recognized people or animals from the sounds they make? You probably can for those people you know well, and the animals that you are familiar with. And the reason you were able to recognize the sounds of the animals is because you know a lot about these animals and their sounds. Another way to say it would be to say that you are familiar with some animals and that's why you can recognize the sounds that they make.

I mention this, because in today's scripture story, we hear about Mary's first meeting with Jesus after his resurrection. And one thing to know about the Resurrected Jesus is that he somehow looks different than he did before his resurrection. We know this because Mary doesn't recognize him right away.

What we hear in the story is that the Resurrected Jesus sounds the same. So, when Jesus says Mary's name, do you remember what happened? Mary recognized Resurrected Jesus by how he spoke to her, by how he said her name.

For the same reason that you are able to recognize certain animals without seeing them, Mary was able to recognize Jesus by the way he said her name - because she was familiar with Jesus and his voice.

What resurrection is, and what it means, is not easily or quickly understood. Mary, in today's story, helps us understand that the more familiar we are with Jesus, the easier it is to recognize the Resurrected Jesus. This is a good reminder, then, of one of the reasons why we choose to regularly read and talk about the Jesus stories – as a way for us to become more familiar with Jesus, his actions, and what he taught. And, the more familiar Jesus is to us, the better we will be at recognizing and understanding him – just like Mary was.

"Thank you, God, for the gift of Jesus to show us the way you want us to live. Alleluia, Christ is Risen! Amen. "

What We Heard on Sunday

Palm Sunday Luke 22:14 – 23:56

Today we hear a story of a humble king. A king who emptied himself of glory and took upon himself the form of a servant and died in humiliation on the cross. He is a king that isn't treated like a king. And we are left trying to understand something of the paradox of this king who doesn't fit the mold of a king.

He is asked if he is the King of the Jews – and he gives no answer or merely an ambiguous one. The Sanhedrin want him to admit his guilt, Pilate wants him to explain so that Pilate can find a quick answer to this problem. But there is no easy answer, and Pilate finally gives in to the crowd and sends Jesus to be crucified.

On the way to his crucifixion Jesus is mocked, betrayed and beaten.

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me. It is a dark moment. Father, into my hands I commend my spirit. It is the darkest night of the soul.

His death feels like an end – but not quite yet. We are told the curtain of the temple was torn in two. This curtain separated all but the High Priest from the presence of God but now it is gone and the way to God is wide open for all.

What should our response to Jesus acts of sacrifice and love be? Gratitude of course and more. We are being called into a life in the form of the servant for others.

We are now entering Holy Week. We will walk with Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem, through triumph through humility, power through weakness, victory through suffering, greatness through service. These are the paradoxes set before us this week. These are the paradoxes that we are called to. Amen.
